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

On the excavation side, they specialize in building excavations, septic systems, and small site work. Other projects they've completed include: patio slabs up to large apartments and water service repair to large site work.







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OVERTIME RULE DOUBLES SALARY THRESHOLD. TAKES EFFECT DEC. I

NAHB blasted the Department of Labor (DOL) after it issued its final overtime rule, stating that the regulation will hurt the workers it is intended to help while also causing major harm to the nation's small business owners.

In a hard-hitting official statement, NAHB Chairman Ed Brady said: "The sheer arrogance displayed by the Department of Labor in failing to heed the concerns of the nation's small business community will result in severe repercussions that will harm workers, small businesses, housing affordability, job growth and the economy.

"By radically doubling the current overtime salary limit of \$23,660 to \$47,476, this blatant regulatory overreach will essentially hurt many of the workers the rule was meant to help. Small business owners across the land, including the vast majority of home building firms, will be forced to scale back on pay and benefits, as well as cutting workers' hours in order to avoid overtime requirements and remain in business.

"Congress can play a constructive role by moving quickly to pass the Protecting Workplace Advancement and Opportunity Act (House bill H.R. 4773 and Senate bill S. 2707), legislation that would force the agency to withdraw this rule until it has considered the effects it would have on small businesses, consumers, workers and the economy."

The rule, which will take effect Dec. 1, indexes the salary threshold to inflation every three years, forcing employers to go through this process on an ongoing basis. Moreover, the huge spike in the overtime threshold could force many employers to convert salaried employees to hourly workers in order to remain solvent. These workers could wind up earning less money than they were making previously, and lose the workplace flexibility that comes with being a salaried employee.

This 100% increase to the salary threshold for overtime eligibility will hit the home building industry particularly hard and harm housing affordability. It will reduce jobadvancement opportunities and the hours of full-time construction supervisors, leading to construction delays, increased costs and less affordable housing options for consumers. NAHB estimates more than 96,000 construction supervisors would become overtime eligible under this rule.



PROJECT OF THE MONTH


One of the lowest elevations in the city is the 6th Street underpass by the library. Residents have known for years not to attempt to use 6th Street when it rains because water rushes down the streets from all directions flooding that area.

The city's decision to build a lift station to alleviate the problem is a good choice for Minot residents. This has been an ongoing project for about 2 1/2 years with a lot of negative publicity. Residents wondered why Western Avenue was closed long term and what was taking so long.

Do the great people of Minot know that the project was moving forward at a great pace until Minot became inundated with four inches of rain in 30 minutes? Guess where the water went? Hence the reason for the lift station.

This photo shows the damage of all the rain. This is a 36 foot deep hole filled with the rain water. The shoring and bracing holding the dirt in place collapsed. Devastating! It was decided

that the hole should be filled with sand until decisions could be made on how to proceed as winter was right around the corner.



the spring of 2015. Contractors had to dig out all of the sand, crane out the bent beams and shoring, re-dig deeper and wider than before. They had to pound in new and longer shoring to the depth of 46 feet. The contractor had to place three, high strength



concrete ring beams around the parameter. Finally the protection was in place and the lift station could be started. Contractors set up footings, walls and floors for the lift station. Again, high strength concrete was placed. Steel beams were installed in the upper part of the building to ensure safe installation of the massive water pumps. These pumps force water back into the Mouse River. Roughly 200 feet of three foot diameter pipe was connected to the pump. Electricians and plumbers worked side by side with the general contractor to get the job done. Decorative tilt up concrete panels were trucked into Minot and put into place - that is the

building that you see above ground. Notice how closely they matched the City Library across the street. These photos show the depth of the 1st wall forms, an inside view of the workers placing concrete around the pumps, electrical and pipes as well as the building above ground.

Today, Western Avenue is open. Businesses and residents in the area have struggled but have been

patient. Pumps will be turned on in mid-June. Sidewalks, curb, gutter and landscaping will tidy things up. The work is almost complete.

From the outside it looks just like a big concrete building across from the library. As a resident and as an employee of one of the companies so involved with this project I know the struggles, delays and many sleepless nights this project cost. I thought it was important that you know the end results will be worth the efforts. Now you know just a little bit more about this endeavor! — Submitted by Susan Stewart—Souris Valley Ready Mix





Whether They're Selling or Staying, Homeowners Rush to Remodel

The national shortage of homes for sale is not only pushing up housing prices, it's also pushing up the numbers for home improvement projects, according to a recent report. Both sellers hoping to get top dollar and homeowners who just can't afford to trade up are plowing money into remodeling.



Bathroom projects continue to reign supreme: 81% of remodelers did work on this most special of rooms in 2015, according to a National Association of Home Builders survey of 274 remodelers. Kitchen overhauls were next on the list, at 79%, followed by whole house remodeling, at 49%, and room additions, at 47%.

Window and door replacements fell to 36% of the most common work in 2015, from 45% a year earlier, according to the survey.

"Homeowners are feeling good about the financial positions they're in" after the dark days of the recession, says longtime Wichita, KS, remodeler Tim Shigley, chair of the association's remodeling arm. So for more people, "it's time to make an improvement on their house."

Whole-home remodeling projects were up 10% in 2016 over 2013, according to the survey. Room additions rose by 12%, and finished basements increased 8%.

The desire for better and newer amenities—granite countertops, anyone?—drove the increase in remodeling work, according to the survey.

The need to replace and repair older fixtures and work (e.g., ugly bathroom tiling) was the second most cited reason homeowners reached out to contractors. That was followed by wanting more space; trying to avoid moving to another home; and outfitting their property so they could comfortably grow old in their existing homes.

The hammer, tiles, and paint usually come out when the economy and the housing market are strong, so homeowners feel confident, and have the cash and home equity lines of credit, for costly remodels, says Craig Webb, editor of Remodeling magazine. The work also typically goes up when home prices rise and owners

want to get top dollar before listing their properties.

But before homeowners max out their credit cards, cash out their 401(k)s, or take out hefty loans, they should think twice before shelling out large sums on costly remodels if they plan to sell in the near future.

"Suppose you've decided you want to have a kitchen exactly like you did when you grew up, so all the appliances are avocado green," Webb says. "Someone with more modern taste will walk in and not care that you spent tens of thousands of dollars to re-create your childhood dream."

Therefore owners shouldn't race to make too many costly improvements if they plan to flip the property soon, says Shigley.

"Do the remodel for yourself," Shigley says. "Don't be thinking of the next homeowner."

Improve Your Home's Energy **Efficiency with Technology**

With our summer building months in full swing in ND, I want to point out some in-demand features home buyers are looking to incorporate when building. The NAHB article below listed several popular ways home owners can save money with incorporated technology. Consider offering these options and more to set your builds above the rest.

Today's home buyers are looking for ways to incorporate home technologies that increase the long-term value of their house but also provide convenience, safety and comfort. In fact, NAHB research shows that most home buyers desire an energy-efficient home and are willing to pay more for it. NAHB's consumer preferences survey of more than 3,600 recent and prospective home buyers examined the features, products, amenities and layouts preferred in a new home.

In the home technology category, home buyers highly ranked features that improve a home's efficiency, including multi-zone heating, ventilation and air-conditioning (HVAC), lighting controls and a programmable thermostat. By incorporating the following technologies, home owners can save money on their utility bills:

Automated HVAC systems can maintain a more energy-efficient temperature while the home owners are away at work, but switch to a more comfortable temperature prior to their arrival home. Zones can also be created to heat or cool only the areas most used by the occupants, keeping other areas, such as guest bedrooms, shut down until they are needed. According to ENERGY STAR, a joint program of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and the U.S. Department of Energy, programmable thermostats can save consumers about \$180 per year in energy costs.

Tankless water heaters — which save energy by heating water only when needed — are comparable in cost to traditional gas water heaters but are 30% more efficient, according to the U.S. Department of Energy.

Lighting can make up 10-20% of the total electrical usage of the home. Installing an automatic dimmer, which adjusts to the home owner's needs based on time of day or occupancy, will lower electricity bills and increase the life expectancy of light bulbs.

Blinds and drapes can be programmed to close during the hottest part of the day to block out the sun; keeping the house cooler. In the colder winter months, they can open up to allow the sun in to warm the house, which helps regulate the room temperature.

By incorporating technologies that help make your home operate more efficiently, ENERGY STAR estimates that home owners can save \$200 to \$400 annually on their energy bills.

People who show they care and are concerned about the future of the building industry make contributions to NDAB-PAC because they believe that cooperation equals strength. You alone can't influence the Legislature or Congress on issues that can

devastate your business. NDAB-PAC is your front line of defense. It monitors legislative issues and works to protect and promote the building industry. By pooling contributions from NDAB members, NDAB-PAC is able to help elect legislators who understand and support the issues and concerns of builders and associate members.

The same goes for the National level and that is why we work closely with BUILD-PAC the National Association of Home Builders' Political Action Committee, one of the most recognized and well-respected PACs in Washington. NDAB works closely with Julia Bogue who is the Lobbyist with NAHB and has direct contact in DC with Senator Heitkamp, Senator Hoeven and Congressman Cramer and their staffers weekly. When an issue arises that impacts ND builders and our industry, Julia will contact us and a callto-action is sent out to our members asking that contact be made to the delegation asking for support in ways of voting in favor or not in favor of a particular bill. The combined efforts have saved an average of \$5,700 per housing start for a typical home builder across the nation. The areas where the victories were achieved in 2015 included lower FHA mortgage insurance premiums, the defeated proposal to raise mortgage guarantee fees, PMI tax deduction extended, energy efficient remodeling tax credit extended and energy efficient home tax credit extended.

Each local association has two Trustees that represent on behalf of the local members and help decide which candidates NDAB-PAC will support financially at a local and a statewide level. From the standpoint of BUILD-PAC, we have two trustees that represent us from North Dakota at the National level that help decide where the funds are distributed.
